The first signs of Spring are in the air this month. Planting begins with fruit trees, roses, berries, grapes and brambles, followed by potatoes, rhubarb and many of the cool season vegetables.

Finish pruning perennials & roses, but most importantly feed everything in the landscape with my specially blended "All Natural Plant Food". This one food will feed plants for the next 3 months without harming dogs, pets and children.
